Healthy Mushroom Spinach Pasta

INGREDIENTS:

- ☐ (16 oz./1 LB./ 1 box) of bow tie pasta
- □ 3-4 cups of spinach
- 8oz (about 1-1/2 cups) of mushrooms
- ☐ 1 small white onion
- ☐ 3 tbsp vegan butter
- ☐ 2 TBSP olive oil
- ☐ Salt/Pepper to taste
- □ Green onions or scallions

About 6 servings

INSTRUCTIONS:


- Boil your water in a pan and cook pasta about 15 minutes
- While pasta is cooking rinse your spinach and place in a bowl
- In a skillet add butter and chopped mushrooms and onion and let cook for about 10 minutes
- 4. Once pasta is done, drain and pour over the spinach while it's hot so it will soften the spinach slightly and pour olive oil over the pasta before it gets sticky (salt/pepper to taste)
- 5. Pour butter, mushroom, onion mixture over the top and mix everything up
- 6. Optional if it's to dry for you add a little more butter or olive oil
- 7. Top with scallion or green onions

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


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Did you know that Randolph County Senior Center is a great place to buy books?

Our group of book readers were extra busy last month and read 8 books. All books received a thumbs up from their reader. We're very low key and we just enjoy talking with each other about the books we've read.

Tailspin by Sandra Brown

Rye Mallet is a freight dog pilot, who agreed to fly an urgent cargo on Thanksgiving evening, in weather that has grounded all other pilots. His landing is sabotaged by lasers aimed at the cockpit. After a crash landing, Brynn, a physician, meets him to take the package, but she is not the designated receiver. This is a romantic adventure story takes place over forty-eight hours. The theme delves into the approval process for cancer drugs and the ways in which the ethics of both medicine and politics intersect this process. Reader gave a thumbs up.

Booked for Trouble (Lighthouse Library Mysteries series) by Eva Gates

She has gained the attention of two eligible suiters. Suzanne, her socialite mother, enters the picture ready to take her back to Boston. In a very public fight Suzanne verbally attacks former classmate Karen Kivas. The next morning Karen turns up dead outside the lighthouse. Lucy must attempt to solve the mystery in order to save her mother. Thumbs up.

Reading up a Storm (Lighthouse Library Mysteries series) by Eva Gates

After a successful party at the Lighthouse Library, Lucy is ready to retire.

However, a storm is moving in and lights on the beach appear to be leading a foundering boat towards the shore. Lucy calls the Coast Guard and two people are rescued. A couple days later one of the two rescued individuals turns up dead. Many readers really enjoy the characters and plots of these mystery stories. Thumbs up.

Connections in Death by J.D. Robb

A new school and youth shelter are being built by Homicide cop Eve Dallas and her very rich husband, Roarke. They have hired Dr. Rochelle Pickering, a child psychologist to run their program. Lyle, Rochelle's brother, was recently released from prison. He is living with her while working to get his life back on track. Rochelle returns home, after an evening out, to find her brother dead on her couch with a syringe in his lap. This proves not to be a simple OD, but a homicide which Eve and Roarke work hard to solve. Thumbs up.

On Leaving Charleston by Alesandra Ripley

This story spans the years 1900 to 1935. The initial setting is Charleston, SC where the South is still recovering from the Civil War. The story also takes us to New York, England and Paris. We see a way of life changed by the automobile, electric lights, telephones and the Roaring 20'fs. Southern belle, Garden Tradd, marries Sky Harris, a dashing Yankee. Sky's mother has past ties to Charleston and she becomes an evil, revenge-filled presence in their marriage. For those who enjoy historical fiction and stories of the South this is very much a thumbs up read.

Deep in the Valley (Grace Valley Trilogy) by Robyn Carr

June Hudson left Grace Valley, California, to become a nurse, but returned years later as a doctor. She was following in the footsteps of her father, Elmer, the town doctor. June is now 37, still single with few hopes of finding love in this secluded valley. That was true until Jim, an undercover DEA agent, secretly enters her life.

Just Over the Mountain (Grace Valley Trilogy) by Robyn Carr

In this part of the trilogy June's high school sweetheart, who abandoned her years ago to marry her rival, returns to town, recently divorced, with his two sons. A mystery develops as June's Aunt Myrna has human bones found in her yard. Myrna is a writer, who for years has sold mystery stories about vengeful wives killing their wayward husbands and disposing of their bodies in such manner.

Down by the River (Grace Valley Trilogy) by Robyn Carr

June Hudson seems to swell with happiness as her secret lover retires from undercover work and is wholeheartedly accepted into the valley. Aunt Myrna faces a court battle over the bones found in her yard, and she too has entertained a secret love - though all through letters - for years. The town's preacher has gambled with life - and almost lost. Flood waters threaten this peaceful valley and the town must pull together to survive. Engaging stories, loveable characters which made for a fun summer read. Thumbs up.




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SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL SENIOR CENTERS MONTH!!!

Getting to Know CRT: Fun Fact- The North and South Loop are two different bus routes. Switch buses at the Senior Center to travel between these two routes. There are 8 primary stops in both loops. If you are anywhere along the route and want a ride, just wave your hand and we will stop. All fares along the route are only \$1.25 for a one-way trip. Route Deviation and Demand Response services are available at an additional cost.

Getting to Know CRT: Elkins North and South Loop schedule and service

Hop on Country Roads Transit to get around town. Our public transportation service is open to everyone in Upshur and Randolph Counties. And it's easy. You can meet us anywhere along our route---for just \$1.25 one-way. September is National Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month

Now is a perfect time for you to learn more about this disease and know the symptoms. Each year, over 22,000 women in the U.S. get ovarian cancer. It's the fifth leading cause of cancer death among U.S. women. Early diagnosis is the key to survival, and the key to early diagnosis is recognizing the symptoms of ovarian cancer:

- Bloating
- Pelvic or abdominal pain
- Trouble eating or feeling full quickly
- Urgency or frequency of urination

Women have unique health concerns, including certain types of cancers and high rates of chronic disease. Currently there's no effective screening test for ovarian cancer, and it can be very hard to identify ovarian cancer early. The signs and symptoms of ovarian cancer aren't always clear and may be hard to recognize. It's important to pay attention to your body and know what's normal for you. If you notice any changes in your body that last for 2 weeks or longer, talk to your doctor and ask about possible causes. Symptoms may be caused by something other than cancer, but the only way to

know is to see your doctor, nurse, or other health care professional.

Make sure to ask your doctor about your level of risk for ovarian cancer at your.
